

India After the Elections: Assessing the Present Conjuncture

Advertised as the "world's largest democratic exercise", the General Election to the Indian Parliament, April-May 2014 was an eagerly anticipated event. The result awarded the Bhartiya Janata Party (BJP)- led National Democratic Alliance (NDA) an unprecedented mandate; something that took even the most astute political observers by surprise. The election result has humiliated the Congress- the grand old party of India- and reduced other opposition parties, including the mainstream Left parties, to a status of political triviality. However, as the dust begins to settle on the euphoric reception of the result, Narendra Modi's victory begs a closer analysis of the present political conjuncture.

The Interdisciplinary Workshop in Colonial and Postcolonial Studies invites you to join us for an extended conversation and analysis of the 2014 national elections and the current political situation. The panel will focus on region-wise trends of the 'national mandate', the outlook for minorities and other marginalized groups, and the collective responsibility of citizens and government in a democracy.




